- 90 COVID-19 IMPACTS: Fire agencies in Marin are beginning to feel the potential negative
- 91 impacts of the covid-19 omicron variant. We have experienced seven breakthrough covid-19
- cases here at NFD, including one at admin. Per tracing protocols, three of those cases led to the
- 93 quarantine of other non-vaccinated NFD employees. Through our partnership with the Marin
- 94 Public Health Department and Novato's Marin Community Services Non-profit, we have
- acquired 180 home test packets that have been distributed to our employees for home use. Each
- 96 employee has received two packets, with two tests in each packet for home testing as needed.
- 97 The idea is to provide an added layer of testing so employees can confirm their status from home
- 98 as needed.
- 99 Kronos: Telestaffing/HR tracking system update: Kronos reports that they continue to make
- substantial progress on the data recovery phase. Based on the results of their initial pilot
- program, they have now developed a more detailed customer restoration process to bring
- 102 customers back online in a safe and secure fashion. Customers should expect to receive an
- outline on the next steps for this process by the end of the day Friday, December 31. They will
- also be providing an initial restoration checklist to all customers within the next 72 hours. This

- Director Goines commented that a meeting was held on December 16, 2021. The approval of the environment compliance shaded fuel break project in Mill Valley met with no objections. Several policies have been adopted including: a policy by which to nominate a President and Vice President and a Code of Conduct. 3 new members were added to the Citizens Oversight Committee. The smaller agencies in the MWPA have asked the MWPA to staff up to help plan projects and have work performed. So the MWPA will be looking to add mitigation specialists, an admin and vegetation project leaders. The MWPA funds that have been spent on public or private land was questioned as to its legality. It has been established by legal counsel that the MWPA funds can be used anywhere in Marin. The funds are used to augment the Parks' budget, not replace. Director Goines will be stepping down as President at the end of June 2022 but looks forward to serving as the District representative.

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4. District Infrastructure Improvement Committee (Directors Francisco and Silverman) Director Silverman noted that there was an internal meeting with Chief Dague and Chief Tyler to clarify some questions for ABM to answer. Chief Tyler noted that in a meeting with ABM, they have been asked to clarify why independent quotes are lower than the AMB proposal. It was a good meeting, and by the end of the month Chief Tyler noted they should be ready to report on the next steps.

OPEN TIME FOR PUBLIC EXPRESSION

Bruce Bartel noted a Marin IJ article stating the Novato Fire District has the lowest vaccination rate among fire agencies in Marin. He hopes that the District will do what it can to raise the vaccination rate.

PRESENTATIONS

1. District Counsel Riley Hurd presented a review on the Brown Act for the Board of Directors. Hurd noted case studies and changes in the Brown Act, due to Covid. Hurd also reviewed Meeting procedures governed by Rosenberg's Rules of Order. Hurd noted it's important to make a motion after public comment, as the public comment may influence the Director's opinion.

Director Goines asked about the Board being able to respond to public comment and what to do if the public is incorrect.

Counsel Hurd commented that the Board cannot discuss or deliberate items that are not on the agenda. The Open Time for Public Expression section is not for deliberation, but just to receive the input from the public. The Board can correct incorrect public comment during discussion after the Open Time for Public Expression period is closed.

There was no public comment.

2. MWPA Projects Past, Present And Future was presented by Vegetation Management Program Manager Mike Swezy.

VPPM Swezy presented a Powerpoint regarding the Novato/MWPA projects. Highlights included: Development of fuel breaks, House out framework for wildfire mitigation. He reviewed the process behind every project including planning, compliance, resources, reporting and maintenance.

Swezy reviewed past projects, and projects slated for year 1 and year 2. Swezy also discussed evacuation route clearing.

Director Davis asked about evacuation drills. Swezy and Chief Tyler commented that evacuation drills will happen with the Zonehaven rollout.

Director Silverman asked about the road cleanup and CEQA. Swezy noted that compliance is needed, and beginning February 1, a bird survey is also required.

Director Goines asked about the evacuation route clearing and noted he has heard some of the public is critical. Are they given advance notice of the work.



Swezy noted that there are social media posts, sandwich boards in the neighborhood, and electronic signs.

Goines also commented about the criticism of vegetation management and bad science with regard to the 200' of fuel break, or will that vary? He asked about the challenge of getting the necessary info to the public?

Swezy noted that it is a challenge in total to clear about 1000 acres, but it is mainly clearing broom. The goal is to lower the fuel profile but maintain a healthy ecological approach.

COVID-19 IMPACTS: New Issue—all Marin fire chiefs were notified by acting public health officer Dr. Lisa Santora that a new directive is coming from Marin County Public Health, that will require first responders (*Police and Fire*) to be vaccinated & boosted and REMOVE the testing option for those unvaccinated and not boosted. All labor groups have been notified.

Staffing Update: All fire stations are fully staffed. We currently have 1 out Covid positive employees. All those testing positive are considered to have natural immunity for up to 90 days per the county guidelines.

Administration Update: Effective February 7, 2022 the District resumed normal field and administrative operations while also maintaining the existing Covid-19 Prevention Plan, and all federal, state, and local directives. Administrative personnel will return to a normal schedule, and normal office hours.

Proposed Marin Fire Based Dispatch Update: Proposal is still subject to modification—final decision date is TBD with NFD BOD approval. There is no recommendation at this time. Due to technical limitations related to CAD, fee-for-service concerns and the lack of Command and Control, Marin Fire agencies are examining alternative dispatch options. Previous analysis regarding a possible joint operation with REDCOM have been set aside for now. The following options are now being examined and cost out:

- 1) A fully independent Fire Dispatch JPA, and
- 2) An independent Fire Dispatch JPA with a Fire CAD configuration linked to MCSO CAD. This independent "spoke" configuration is what Redcom uses, linked to the SCSO.

Governance: Both options assume the creation of a new Fire JPA, which would operate as an independent agency, with a Board of Directors to be defined, representing Marin Fire agencies, local jurisdictions 'representatives, and Marin's EMS Authority. For both options, an Executive Director would manage staffing and all aspects of the Communications Center's operations. A Technical Manager would ensure that all needs are met with respect to CAD and other reporting. 24-hour Command and Control will be added (3 MCFD Captains). The staffing model includes 12 dispatchers, 4 Supervisors and budget to up-staff during fire season. The fully independent option 1 also includes an additional Technical



Systems Specialist, since the CAD system would be fully independent from MCSO. Staffing costs below assume a JPA model similar to REDCOM. If staff were to be public employees, costs would increase.

Location: Los Gamos remains the most likely / feasible option for a new Fire Dispatch Center. For both option 1 (fully independent Fire Dispatch) and option 2 (CAD remains linked to MCSO subscription), we believe that the Fire Dispatch could remain co-located in the current Comm Center, with adequate physical separation.

Costs: It is anticipated that there would be one time start up then ongoing annual costs. The projected on-going costs for Marin Fire agencies (other than MCFD) represent a 36% increase for the fully independent option, or a 27% increase for option 2 (CAD linked to MCSO). **NFD projected costs for fully independent option would go from \$553,415** (22/23) to \$754,430; an increase of \$202,015.

- o Vegetation Fire West Marin—Currently in initial attack

- Vehicle Accidents: Seven, including two significant accidents along Novato Blvd. near Stafford Lake.
- Of note, the latest fuels charts and ERC values are approaching record dry values with 100 and 1000-hour fuels dropping quickly. The live fuel component is still very high from the early winter rains as plants are starting to come out of dormancy meaning the district is entering a complicated situation. Bottom line is the fire weather concerns are elevated by historical February standards. We suspect the fuel charts and ERC are foreshadowing an early wildland season. We have directed the Chiefs of Training and Fleet to prepare for an "early-up" of the 2022 season.
- National Weather Service: No forecast updates needed this morning. Winds are much lighter with very dry air mass in place allowing for a cool start to the day most locations. Satellite shows some increasing mid and high-level clouds as a weak mid-level shortwave will drop down the coast. Not much reflection at the surface and only impact will be the increasing high clouds through the day from north to south. Winds at the surface and through the boundary layer to remain light offshore with cold air over the Great Basin. Weather pattern remains quiet Friday with another mostly sunny day and highs into the 60s. Trend for the weekend will be warming as 850 MB temps gradually rise as high pressure



becomes centered over CA. By Sunday, lower 70s should become more common across the region with comfortable mid and upper 60s for daytime highs elsewhere. Pattern looks stable all next week with ~585dm high setting up to the northwest of Cape Mendocino. That means no rain, not much fog, unseasonably warm days and cool nights. Will need to watch for any offshore wind bursts but pattern doesn't suggest we'll see to many shortwaves dropping into the Great Basin.

He asked the Board if they are willing to accept the liability that will come as a result of the possible detrimental effects of the vaccine. He noted with inoculations and booster only providing some measure of protection for a few months, versus natural immunity, what is the rationale behind demanding multiple boosters. He noted on behalf of the Association the objection to Firefighters losing their career at a time when mask mandates are being lifted.

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Battalion Chief Kyle Dague spoke on behalf of the Chief Officers' Association, noting they are unanimous in their objection to member careers being threatened due to the members' personal health choices. The Operational battalion chiefs do not support punitive action against any member relating to the vaccine or the booster.

 - When practicable, avoid using indoor breakrooms or cafeterias and avoid eating indoors or sleeping indoors when others are present in the same airspace.
 - We are well over 90 percent vaccinated. We are seeing additional employees that were
 not yet boosted, get boosted to become fully up to date. We have received 10 requests for
 either medical or religious exemption, and are initiating the review and interactive
 process. Impacts & Effects bargaining continue with session 3 was completed. We are
 awaiting a counter proposal.

Marin County Fire Chiefs Association sent a letter to the Marin Board of Supervisors requesting that the Marin Board of Supervisors assist in the following:

- Slowing the implementation of the mandatory vaccination mandate for first responders to allow for adequate time to manage what has become a complicated human resources process; including a compulsory impacts and effects bargaining process with labor against immediate immutable deadlines, and
- Requesting amendments to the order that both meet the intent of the community safety and allow fire agencies to maintain staffing. Amendments including reasonable accommodations such as a verifiable masking and testing cadence that assures high levels of covid-19 risk containment and prevention--while limiting spread in high-risk occupancies and community wide, that is consistent with federal, State CDC guidance, the vast majority of other neighboring counties.

The letter concludes that fire agencies have successfully managed three different variants and two very busy fire seasons without ever compromising staffing or the safety of the communities we serve. The Marin Fire Chiefs are confident that with some minor amendments and additional time we can maintain the current high levels of 9-1-1 response to public fire & life safety, which is considered critical infrastructure, while maintaining the highest level of public health.

1. Review of Draft Preliminary Budget for FY 2022-2023.

Finance Director Valenti detailed the annual budget summary.

Highlights were:

Revenue is projected at \$37 million, operating expenditures are projected to be \$32.3 million, capital outlay at \$4.7 million, and IGT \$1.2 million.

Unassigned fund balance is at \$3.6 million. FD Valenti commented that the economy is an unknown, with expected high inflation and increased costs across markets, but that this year property revenue is 6% over last year.

FD Valenti commented that it appears the housing market is cooling due to a raise in interest rates.

Novato Fire District Board of Directors Special Finance Meeting Committee Minutes June 15, 2022

Director Goines asked about the OPEB funding.

mFD Valenti noted that the property tax revenue will trigger MOU salary increases, which can lead to increased contributions to OPEB and MCERA. Director Davis asked if NFD needs to contribute more to OPEB, where can we pull the funds from?

FD Valenti noted that we maintained \$3.5 million in the assigned reserve, as NFD is not expecting the increase in property tax revenue to hold over into next year. Funds can be allocated from the OPEB reserve and/or the District can make cuts or delay expenses.

FD Valenti reviewed last years budget and the 2022-23 proposed budget. Highlights included program expenditures increasing by 5.8%. The District has budgeted for a Training Captain position, a shadow mechanic position and a Public Educator.

Capital expenditures are up 125% due to delays of apparatus purchases from 2020 and 2021.

Director Goines noted that there could be some MWPA funding applicable to the Public Educator position. He asked if this budget version had any MWPA information.

FD Valenti noted that the MWPA budget will be a separate document and he will be working with staff to craft an MWPA budget for the District.

FD Valenti reviewed the 2013-2022 history of revenue. He noted again the 6% increase in property tax, and the extra \$200,000 from the increase in the special tax. He noted that the 3% salary increase was accounted for in the preliminary budget. Other revenues are IGT at \$2.2 million and EMS billing fees at \$2.4-\$2.7 million.

FD Valenti reviewed the operating budget, noting that 80% of this section of the budget is salaries and benefits. Services and supplies are about 15-20% of the budget. Some notable program increases are the resumption of a Reserve Program, Cyber Security upgrades, gas and fuel expenses, and utility expenses.

FD Valenti reviewed the capital outlay portion of the budget, which is about \$4.6 million. Funds have already been set aside for these projects, so the Board will have the option to pay cash or finance.

FD Valenti reviewed the assigned fund balances.

Director Goines commented that the Rainy Day fund and the Unassigned reserve funds essentially represent our cash reserves.

FD Valenti commented that the Rainy Day funds can be used in a catastrophic event, or in case the expected revenue drops by 15% or more. The unassigned funds will be allocated by the Board as they see fit in a future meeting.

Director Goines asked about the MWPA budget for Novato Fire's share of the funds. FD Valenti noted that he will work with BC Dicochea and Captain Osgood on that document.

Director Davis noted that the District is in a fairly healthy position now and for the next year.

There was no public comment.

- 42 Administrative Items:
- 43 Training/Control Burns at H Ranch were suspended by Air Quality Management District for
- 44 today Wednesday June 22. It is anticipated that conditions will improve for the burns on
- Thursday and Friday. The training area is part of privately owned H-Ranch except for a small 45
- section of the Indian Tree Open Space Preserve, which is managed by Marin County Parks. All 46
- 47 the burning will be conducted in accordance with the Bay Area Air Quality Management District
- 48 and with other fire participating fire agencies in Marin, including the Novato Fire Protection
- 49 District. Event organizers will be in daily contact with the air control district to evaluate smoke
- 50 dispersal. Training organizers understand resident concerns about conducting controlled burns
- 51 during a spring season that has produced very little rain. The burn site is surrounded by a
- combination of fire control lines and dirt roads that are in place to keep the fire from spreading 52
- 53 beyond the training area. Additional firefighters are also on hand to support the holding
- 54 operations.
- 55 Fireworks: The 4th of July is fast approaching. All fireworks, including consumer fireworks, are
- 56 illegal in Novato and Marin County. In addition, consumer fireworks are NO longer available for
- sale in Petaluma, nor in Cotati, Healdsburg, Santa Rosa, Sonoma, Unincorporated Sonoma, or 57
- 58 Windsor. Safe & Sane Fireworks ARE still allowed in Cloverdale, Rohnert Park, and Sebastopol.
- 59 NFD will be putting out on social media stressing the hazards and risks of fireworks. Chief
- 60 Whittet will send out a press release prior to the 4th of July There is a good chance that people
- 61 will celebrate the 4th of July with illegal fireworks. Last year (2020 & 2021) NPD responded to
- calls 96 for fireworks. As in the past, if members of the public bring in any fireworks to the fire 62
- 63 stations, we refer them to NPD. If available, an NPD officer will meet them at the City Corp yard
- and put them in a safe locker until they can be destroyed. 64
- 65 Increase in vegetation fire starts: We have experienced a jump in fire starts from our homeless
- population this month. There have been over 10 starts in the last two weeks attributed to several 66
- identified individuals of interest. Four individuals have been cited, and or arrested only to be 67
- released immediately by the sheriff's office. We are working with our local law enforcement 68
- partners to build cases for the DA's consideration for additional charges. 69
- 70 Field Day: This Saturday, June 25th the North Marin RACES team will meet at Novato Fire
- Admin to participate in "Field Day". Every June, more than 40,000 radio operators throughout 71
- 72 North America set up temporary transmitting stations in public places to demonstrate amateur
- 73 radio's science, skill and service to our communities and our nation. It combines public service,
- 74 emergency preparedness, community outreach, and technical skills all in a single event. This
- 75 year, our North Marin RACES team will simulate the EOC has been damaged in a major
- 76 earthquake forcing the team to establish local, regional and national communications from the
- 77 parking lot using a temporary antenna and non-domestic alternative power. The team will be led
- 78 by Novato resident Mr. Jerry Foster who, for the past 35 years, has stood at the ready in case



disaster strikes our community. Field Day has been an annual event since 1933, and remains a

- 80 popular event to practice emergency communications response and readiness capabilities.
- 81 Evacuation Drill: Novato Fire, Novato Police, MCSO & CHP will be hosting an Evacuation Drill
- 82 Event for the Pacheco Valle and Black Point areas, Saturday, June 25th. Notifications will be
- 83 made via Alert Marin. The Evacuation will start at the two neighborhoods and Margaret Todd
- 84 Center will be the designated meeting places for neighbors. The Evacuation Drill event will
- begin at 9:30 am and will run until noon.
- 86 Captain's Test & Promotions: We completed a Captain's Promotional Test the week before last
- and selected Marvin Blandon for promotion. He will start on July 1st. This promotion created an
- 88 opening in the Engineer's ranks and Chris Goodspeed was promoted to engineer.
- 89 The new Capt./Training Officer position will be announced today. The application period is
- 90 through July 15th. Interview and appointment will follow with an anticipated start date of August
- 91 1st.
- 92 In collaboration & cooperation with the Novato Professional Firefighters Association, we have
- 93 successfully updated the Out of County Personnel and Apparatus Policy #342 incorporating the
- 94 voluntary aspects negotiated in the most recent NPFA MOU. Chief Whittet assisted with the
- planning and implantation aspects of the new policy and we will begin implantation this week.
- 96 Per the MOU, this new policy has three-year implementation and revision features going
- 97 forward.
- 98 NFD Engineers working as Paramedics: We anticipate engineers being able to function as
- 99 paramedics to cover open FF/PM shifts to being on July 1st. This opportunity is the result of fire
- 100 chief station visits and listening sessions to improve our overall EMS delivery, and support our
- medics from having to work excessive mandatory OT shifts. This program deepens the bench of
- available trained and highly skilled resource within our own ranks.
- NFD Reserve Program 2.0: Staff is meeting this week to review the scope of the new reserve
- program designed to enhance our capabilities and bring in new talent to our organization. One of
- the critical features of the program is to be able to fill any vacancies in our ranks when existing
- employees retire, and shorten the reflex time to full time employment, with turn key employees
- that we have trained, vetted, and prepared for success. This is a reimagining of a program we had
- several years ago, bringing it back leaner and more targeted to our current and future staffing
- needs.

The District would like flexibility to adapt as new, urgent projects arise, such as the recent homeless encampment fire that can threaten surrounding areas.

Director Goines noted that the District has a clear process of project management, and did not want the micro management, but an Excel sheet won't be overly burdensome. He noted the use of d space funds should be fully allowable for local projects, and the District needs to remain, as they have been, in compliance with CEQA.

VPPM Mike Swezy noted that all projects meet environmental compliance.

1. Fire Based Dispatch Presentation & Discussion: *Update on Marin County Fire Chiefs Association exploration into fire-based dispatch options, costs and timeframes by Project Manager Charlotte Jourdain.*

- 27 Charlotte Jourdain spoke about the background, the service level enhancements, 2 options for a
- 28 governance model, and budget figures for a new Fire/EMS dispatch center.
- Her presentation is attached to these minutes.
- 30 Highlights:
- 31 Dispatch service from the Marin County Sheriff Office (MCSO) will end 9/2023.
- 32 The goal is to co-locate a new Fire/EMS Dispatch and share the CAD license.
- A new Fire/EMS dispatch could offer the desired technical advancements that the MCSO has not
- been able to deliver, some due to Dept of Justice constrictions.
- 35 Craft a transparent agreement with fees for service from participating fire agencies in Marin
- 36 County.



- 37 Counsel Spoerl commented that the MCSO has no legal obligation to provide dispatch services.
- 38 However, County EMS is obligated to provision a system, but there is no specific agency in the
- 39 County that is required to offer dispatch services. The Dept. of Health and Human Services
- 40 (DHHS) assumed that function, but the DHHS is not the dispatch provider. DHHS must have a
- 41 coordinated pre-hospital EMS system, and must facilitate the process and transition. The County
- does not have to pay for the services, but must coordinate the transition.
- 43 Chief Tyler noted that the MCSO has stated that it has subsidized fire agencies for years and
- cannot continue that practice. The Fire Agencies are leaning towards the Marin County Fire
- Dept. (MCFD) as the contractor as opposed to the JPA model. With MCFD as the contractor, the
- 46 process will be faster, and the agencies can move to a JPA later on if desired. A request will be
- 47 made to the MCSO/County to cover the one-time costs.
- 48 Counsel Spoerl mentioned the JPAgreement model as an option. Ms. Jourdain noted that there
- are difficulties with that model, and will report back on the specific issues.
- Ms. Jourdain noted that impacts to MERA cannot be determined until the Fire/EMS Dispatch is
- 51 standalone.
- 52 Director Francisco asked about surge capabilities. Ms. Jourdain referenced the Redcom staffing
- model. She can provide more data on this point at a later date.
- 54 Stewart Gary of Citygate noted that there are currently no good existing data tools to measure the
- dispatcher managing the apparatus. From call to keyboard time to hand off to dispatcher can be
- measured. 911 centers have the ability to recall off duty dispatchers.
- Ms. Jourdain noted the staffing covers a minimum of 4 on staff at all times, with more added
- during the busy periods during the day, more added for weekends, and then more during
- 59 wildland fire season. The Command/Control employee can also be a dispatcher. The MCFD will
- 60 cover the cost of the Command/Control employee.
- It was noted by all that the new dispatch center will cost more but will come with advancements
- in technology that fire agencies have wanted for decades.
- Questions about how to find fire trained dispatchers were answered by Chief McCarthy the
- senior dispatchers are currently all Fire Dispatchers, and there is interest in coming over to the
- 65 new Fire Dispatch center. In addition, the Woodacre dispatchers are all Fire trained.

83	2 incidents = 24% of the time, which is considered manageable
84	3 or more = 3.95%
85	4 or more = 0.50%
86	Medic 62 runs 5.6% of all EMS calls, which is beginning to creep upward.
87	Topography with curved street infrastructure make it challenging to meet NPFA goals.
88	Stations are appropriately located and are good at reaching 6 minute goal
89	Mr. Gary recommended setting goals divided by city vs rural.
90	There is no socio-economic correlation to structure fires. The fires are very random.
91	85% of total demand for service is in the City of Novato boundaries. 4.4% is outside the District.
92 93 94	In summary, it's not cost effective to add more stations. Maybe consider 3 rd ambulance. Moving station 63 is not cost effective and will not improve travel times. Maybe consider a BLS ambulance.
95	Station 61 has the most call volume, but is placed in the densest part of the District.
96 97	The Directors, Fire Chief and Deputy Chief discussed the pros and cons of adding a BLS ambulance. It could be used as a recruiting tool



98 The meeting paused at 12:17 p.m. for a lunch break. 99 The meeting resumed at 12:52 p.m. 100 3. District Staffing: *Overview and general framework of impacts to staffing* 101 102 Chief Tyler detailed recent conversations with the crews about the uptick in overtime, 103 specifically mandatory overtime. 104 There appear to be many causes: current vacancies, vacations/sick time/worker's comp injuries, 105 long onboarding of new employees, etc. 106 Some recent academy graduates have not successfully completed probation. 107 The District has looked at its constant staffing model, but it has been suggested that the District 108 look into over hiring by 3, or 1 per shift. 109 Director Francisco asked if the 2x4 schedule contributes to mandatory overtime? 110 Chief Tyler noted that we have had the 2x4 schedule for a while, but in 2022, Mandatory OT and 111 Regular OT are practically equal. This has not been the case in the past. 112 Chief Tyler noted that the reason appear to be complex, and he would like for labor and 113 management to work together with an outside third party to find the root cause(s). The high mandatory OT affects the members, their families and morale. 114 115 Suggestions made to improve voluntary OT signup included incentivizing OT sign by receiving mandatory hours, over hire by 3, reducing CTO time, limit leave vacancies to a maximum of 3. 116 improving outreach, doing job fairs, to acquire more experienced firefighter/paramedics, hiring 117 118 bonuses, etc. 119 Director Goines asked about the short term and long-term solutions? 120 Chief Tyler commented that filling the vacant positions is within our immediate control, and we 121 have 4 new hires in backgrounds. The District can over hire by 3, but even that process will take time as backgrounds are lengthy. The cost differential is +\$89.00/day for an extra hire to cover 122 123 vacancies. The District can consider provisional promotions. 124 Director Hadfield suggested using the Reserve members to alleviate some OT. 125 Deputy Chief McCarthy noted that it's difficult to use Reserves as they may be working toward getting all of the qualifications but may not have them yet. They also have other jobs and/or 126 127 school. 128 There was consensus among the Directors to have an objective third party study the causes, and

Reimbursements are returned to the District for the MediCal fee for service patients, who are defined as 130% below the poverty level.

79 The IGT voluntary program is available to all government ambulance service providers. 80 Local governments transfer funds to help fund MediCaid via Partnership Health Plan. The Federal government matches funds. The higher the participation, the higher the reimbursements. 81 82 There is an admin cost of 20%. 83 84 Participation in this program since 2013 has netted the District approximately \$4,700,000. 85 86 The last current program detailed by EMS Wager is GEMT QAF, which is not voluntary. Fees 87 are charged on every single ambulance transports since 2017. The QAF is adjusted annually and 88 this program ends 12/31/2022. All ambulance providers must pay in, but only those MediCal 89 providers receive reimbursements. 90 91 Since 2017, the District has netted \$451,000. 92 93 EMS Wager detailed the new PP-GEMT-IGT program, which replaces all the current programs. 94 95 Funds pass through the State to the Feds, and reimbursements will come back to public agency transporters. CHIEF'S REPORT

Administrative Items:

Rackspace Ransomware Attack: our cloud provider for email experienced a ransomware attack on Friday, December 2 at 2:48am. Rackspace's temporary solution was that all their customers migrate to Office 365. Our IT division has been working with MarinIT and has all emails synced with Rackspace as of Monday, November 28. This did not include Outlook contacts, calendar, or notes. Azar contacted MarinIT on Saturday and began migrating all NFD email to O365. Azar, Jeanne and MarinIT also had to touch all computers to uninstall the old version of Office and install O365. Once all desktop computers have been migrated over to O365. Now we are asking everyone to bring their laptops and iPad into the office so we can migrate those over as well. Once this has all been resolved we will investigate additional precautions at NFD, so we don't experience this again.

New Hire Academy Begins: Thursday Dec 1st started our new FF/PM academy. Three new FF/PM were welcomed and have begun their careers at Novato Fire: Kerrick Woodward-Sollesness, Nathaniel Kleinsasser, and Jared Myer. They will initially focus

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on EMS skill development and protocols, and then transition into fire evolutions and firefighting training.

New FF/PM Interviews: In anticipation of establishing a negotiated over-hire side letter, we have initiated additional candidate interviews for immediate future consideration. The hiring process take several months to complete so we are getting a jump on recruitment and hiring now.

PP GEMT—IGT we were notified by Cal Chiefs that the DHCS has determined based on the LOI returned that there will be an estimated \$18M shortfall to fund the program. If all remains the same, the program will shut down after one year. There will be more to follow.

NFD Reserve Program: We have completed the application for intake of candidates, and posted it to our website. We are reviewing the applications and will hold interviews in the next couple weeks.

Over hire side letter: As discussed at the BOD retreat in October, management had completed and shared draft side letter language to be able to "over-hire" without effecting the constant staffing language in the existing MOU. Labor has had the draft for over three weeks and we are waiting for any proposed revisions from them to see if this can be a workable solution to the mandatory OT concerns.

Our first Greater Novato Fuel Break Public Meeting was completed: Over 70 members of the public attended the zoom meeting Nov 9th to listen to and ask questions of the more than 60 miles of area to be addressed. It was a great opportunity to share the scope and process of the project that will cost millions of dollars and be completed over the next 6-8 years or so.

Valley Memorial Project Field Trip was completed November 15th in conjunction with the Marin Wildfire Prevention Authority (MWPA), and the Ecologically Sound Practices Partnership performed a site visit to view a joint project of Novato Fire and the MWPA. This project includes removal of a small dense stand of eucalyptus trees and revegetation with native plant species.

Pacheco Valle (PV) Evacuation Route: There is a need to further assess the vegetation types, arrangement and proximity to their sole evacuation route out of the Valle, and assist the City of Novato and PV residents with additional removal of vegetation that does not support a safe route out. NFD meet this week with City officials and park residents and offered to work with them at and around the various median choke points. Mike Swezy will be developing a scope which will be shared with the various stakeholders for review and approval, that would also be consistent with other evacuation route assessments and tie into the Greater Novato Fuel Break.



The National Weather Service has significantly updated its forecast. Remaining cool with rain starting again tomorrow (Thurs) mainly after 1000 into late evening and then returning Fri night through Sun night. Fri night will also be winds from the South 7-16 MPH and gusts to 21. Heavy rain is forecast Fri night through Sat. Total Thurs – Fri rain is forecast to be 0.25-0.50"; Fri night – Sat total rain forecast is 2.00-3.00".

Director Goines noted that he attended the Valley Memorial event and the Fuel Break event. They were well attended.

Director Silverman asked if there were any negative comments regarding the fuel break project. Director Goines noted that most attendees were in favor of the project. There were some ecological concerns. The East Bay has had some challenges to similar plans, and it could spill over to other areas.
